- 2. This brick was placed in front of the house to honor a brave soldier and McKinney High School graduate who died during WWII.
- 3. These two bearded boys LOVE Cheerios and will "talk your ear off." See if they will say, "Cheese" for you!
- 4. A farmer would have kept 3 of these. One for milk, one for meat, and one for breeding.
- 5. This is the oldest house in McKinney. The man who built it was a prominent citizen here in McKinney. He was also a very good carpenter. The front door is one of his masterpieces. Take a picture under the Oldest House in McKinney sign.
- 6. This house was built in 1916. Mrs. Lucie Dulaney lived in it with her children. Her son was Joseph Field Dulaney. How old was he when he died?
- 7. This Cottage was built by Dr. Joseph Dulaney. It looks like a Gingerbread House. What is the architecture style called?
- 8. The Two-Bit Taylor Inn welcomed many traveling salesmen. It was saved in 1974 from destruction by being moved to Chestnut Square. There is a newspaper hanging in the kitchen. What year is it dated?
- 9. Do you need a horseshoe? There someone who can help you. Their shop has a special symbol hanging out front.
- 10. The teacher would ring this to signal it was time to come in from recess.
